A Word From the Publisher

When TRANSPORT TOPICS published the first Top 100 list of the largest private carriers in North America in 2002, we weren't sure what to expect.

The world of private carriage was something like a parallel universe for for-hire freight carriers. Though shipper-owned trucks carried fully half of all truck freight tonnage, the business of private and for-hire carriage rarely crossed paths.

Now, after several years of publishing the TRANSPORT TOPICS Private 100, it is apparent that the two worlds have begun to intersect in many significant ways.

Private carriers routinely offer excess freight-hauling capacity to other shippers, competing directly with for-hire carriers for backhauls. And many for-hire carriers have created dedicated contract carriage units to provide dedicated capacity to shippers, replacing some private truck fleets.

Now, with capacity tight and freight rates rising, shippers are beginning to expand the size of their truck fleets once again and are looking for new ways to generate revenue by providing transportation and distribution services to the market.

The move in 2005 by grocery retailer and wholesale distributor Supervalu Inc. to purchase Total Logistic Control, a major provider of refrigerated warehousing and logistics services, is an example of how the lines between private and for-hire carriers are being blurred.

Wal-Mart Stores, the world's largest retailer, was ranked No. 1 on the first TT 100 Private Carriers list in 2002 with a fleet of more than 7,000 tractors. It has since been displaced by food-service distributor Sysco Corp., which topped the 2006 list with 7,455 tractors.

Well over half of the companies on the TT 100 Private Carriers list are involved in the distribution of food and retail merchandise. But the list also features a cross-section of companies from the heart of American industry — paper and wood products, steel distributors and petrochemical suppliers, along with companies that provide more specialized services, such as the delivery of medical supplies and pharmaceuticals (Cardinal Health Corp.) and caskets (Batesville Casket Co.).

On the list, we also can see the growth of distribution specialists such as Reyes Holdings. The Chicago-based company parlayed its ownership of the Martin-Brower Co., a major distributor to McDonald's restaurants, and a collection of regional beer distributors into a \$7.5 billion enterprise that includes grocery supplier Reinhart Foodservice and MBX Logistics, a consulting unit that provides warehousing and distribution, transportation management and freight payment services. Reyes ranks No. 8 on the 2006 TT 100 Private Carriers with more

than 1,500 tractors.

C&S Wholesale Grocers, Keene, N.H., has fueled its growth by taking over distribution operations from smaller retail grocery fleets. C&S operates more than 50 distribution facilities in 14 states and ranks No. 19 with 958 tractors.

What's next? We can't predict the future, but it is our hope that by closely tracking the activities of the largest private carriers, at least we can provide clues about the direction in which both private and for-hire carriers are headed.

In addition to the TT 100 Private Carriers and the TT 100 For-Hire Carriers lists, we publish the TRANSPORT TOPICS Logistics 50, a listing of the largest third-party logistics companies in North America.

And earlier this year, TRANSPORT TOPICS' affiliate, LIGHT & MEDIUM TRUCK magazine, published the Top 50 Commercial Truck Fleets and the Top 50 Utility and Telecom Fleets.

Our goal with each of these lists is to provide not just names and numbers, but insight.



Beverage Fleets, Waste Hauler Among Top 100's Newcomers

The 2006 edition of the TRANSPORT TOPICS Top 100 list of the largest private carriers features several significant additions with the inclusion of beverage fleets, a waste hauler and fleets that specialize in servicing the booming oil and gas sector.

Food processing and grocery distribution firms continue to dominate the list, however, accounting for 45 of the top 100 private carriers in 2006 and about 60% of the total number of tractors owned and operated by the top 100 fleets. Petroleum, chemical and gas companies numbered 19 — two more than a year ago. Wholesale and retail distribution also had 19 companies on the list, followed by manufacturing with 12, building materials and metal products with five and paper and office products with four companies. Altogether, the Top 100 private carriers controlled nearly 90,000 tractors, more than 219,000 trailers and 57,000 straight trucks.

Topping the list for the fourth year in a row is food-service provider Sysco Corp., followed by discount merchandiser Wal-Mart Stores, No. 2, and supermarket operator Ahold USA, No. 3.

Making its first appearance — at No. 4 — is Pepsi Bottling Group. The Indianapolis-based company operates New Bern Transport as a for-hire and private carrier and owns more than 5,600 tractors.

In prior years, beverage fleets, along with most vocational, utility, government and farm and home fuel delivery fleets, were excluded from consideration in compiling the list of top private carriers because of their specialized nature. For several years, New Bern Transport was included on the TRANSPORT TOPICS 100 list of largest for-hire carriers, attesting to the dual nature of its service.

The decision to include beverage fleets in the listing reflects the fact that beverages are a major source of freight for both private and for-hire carriers. Plus, a number of companies previously listed, such as Reyes Holdings and Ben E. Keith Inc., traditionally have hauled beer and other beverages as part of their business.

Joining Pepsi Bottling Group on the list this year, at No. 25, is Charlotte, N.C.-based Coca-Cola Bottling Co. Consolidated, with 905 tractors, and at No. 65, Anheuser-Busch Cos. of St. Louis, with 425 tractors.

The same rationale was applied to waste-hauling fleets. Although garbage collection typically is handled by specialized equipment, tractor-

trailer units are used to transport compacted waste to distant landfills. The only waste hauler to make the TT Private 100 this year is California-based Norcal Waste Systems, No. 86, with 321 tractors.

Also joining the TT Private 100 for the first time are oilfield service specialists Key Energy Services and Basic Energy Services, ranked No. 17 and No. 26, respectively.

Cemex Inc., the largest cement producer in North America, is ranked No. 56, and Pacific Coast Building Products ranks No. 89.

Other newcomers include carpet and flooring manufacturer Mohawk Industries, No. 31; Mobile Mini, a manufacturer of storage containers and portable offices, No. 87; Core-Mark International, a distributor of nongrocery items to convenience stores, No. 88; Valley Proteins, a processor of used cooking oil and animal by-products, No. 73; and food distributors Sara Lee Corp., No. 24; Wakefern Food Corp., No. 74; and United Natural Foods, No. 85.

Information on the size of private carriers, for the most part, was provided directly by company management, supplemented by data from American Trucking Associations and Transportation Technical Services Inc. ATA and TTS each publish directories of for-hire and private fleets.

Private carriers are ranked by the number of tractors they own or lease because tractors are considered the best measure of freight-hauling capacity. The data do not include tractors used by outside carriers that may provide dedicated or common carriage services.
